Toiletrina closes Nugent

Sharp, Davison accept refugees from Nugent floods

The devastation of "Toiletrina," the recent jargon. explosion of a toilet in Nugent Hall, forced Nugent Hall to cancel the stays of its dorm occupants for as long as one week. Yesterday, people in Sharp and Davison halls established the Nugent Hall Visiting Scholars program allowing students staying in Nugent Hall to enjoy the amenities and rooms that Sharp and Davison have to offer.

Under the new program, Sharp and Davison have opened their doors to up to 60 students previously planning on staying in Nugent for the next week.
